ANT 2201: HISTORICAL ARCHAEOLOGY COURSE OUTLINE – ACADEMIC YEAR 2017/2018 SEMESTER II

4 CREDITS/60 HOURS – 3 lectures and 1 tutorial per week for one semester

A. DESCRIPTION

This class will examine historical archaeology. Students will learn the theory and the practice of the excavation and interpretation of historical archaeological field sites. Students will learn to conduct documentary and oral history research, to plan and conduct an archaeological field excavation, and to integrate the tools of history, archaeology, and sociocultural anthropology in the interpretation of research data.

Students will be required to read and discuss the assigned readings, to design and conduct a field survey, and to write a final report on their research.

B. OBJECTIVES

To familiarize students with historical archaeology, and its theory, methods and practice. To encourage students to think about the implications of an applied or public archaeology for development in Guyana and the region.

C. METHODS OF ASSESSMENT

1. Research Plan; Students will develop clear and cogent research questions, and methodologies aimed at answering these questions. 20 MARKS.

- **2. Descriptive Report**: A paper of approximately 1,500 words describing the finds of the student's supervised archaeological investigation. 20 MARKS.
- **3. Final Report**: A full length research paper, of approximately 5,000 words, based on supervised archival, ethnographic and/or archaeological research conducted throughout the semester. <u>60</u> MARKS.
