Historical Notes

 Γ he University of Guyana is Guyana's sole national higher education institution. It was established in April 1963 with the following Mission: "To discover, generate, disseminate, and apply knowledge of the highest standard for the service of the community, the nation, and of all mankind within an atmosphere of academic freedom that allows for free and critical enquiry." It began its operations in October of the same year at Queens College, the nation's premier secondary school, before moving to the Turkeven Campus in 1970. At first, programmes were confined to the Arts, Natural Sciences, and Social Sciences. A Faculty of Education was created in 1967, and this was followed by the Faculty of Technology in 1969, the Institute for Distance and Continuing Education (IDCE), in 1975, the Faculty of Agriculture in 1977, and the Faculty of Health Sciences in 1981, the latter as an outgrowth of Natural Sciences.

A Forestry Unit was established in 1987 and it subsequently became part of the Faculty of Agriculture, and in 2003 the Faculties of Arts and Education merged to become the School of Education and Humanities. Additionally, the turn of the millennium saw the formation of the School of Earth and Environmental Sciences (SEES). born of the merger of the Geography Department and the Environmental Studies Unit. Also created were the Biodiversity Centre, which is pertinent to the activities pursued by SEES, the Faculty of Natural Sciences, and the Faculty of Agriculture and Forestry, and a Centre for Information Technology (CIT), which serves the entire university. The University of Guyana expanded in 2000 with the addition of the Berbice Campus at Tain. In October 2016, as part of a broader reorganisation, which is discussed below, SEES was transformed into the Faculty of Earth and Environmental Studies, with a Dean, rather than a Director, as academic and administrative head of the unit.

The University of Guyana now offers more than 120 undergraduate and graduate (post-graduate) programmes, including in Natural Sciences, Engineering, Environmental Studies, Forestry, Urban Planning and Management, Tourism Studies, Education, Creative Arts, Economics, Law, Medicine, Optometry and Nursing. The 2017-2018 academic year witnessed the introduction of several new undergraduate and graduate programmes, including ones in Psychology, Agro-technology and Business, Entrepreneurship, Supply Chain Management, and Visual Communications and Social Work. Several online programmes are available, as are extra-mural classes through the IDCE at four locations--in the city of Georgetown and the towns of Anna Regina, Essequibo, Region 2; Linden, Upper Demerara, Region 10; and New Amsterdam, Berbice, Region 6. The institution has a 2018 enrollment of just over 8,000 students from all 10 administrative regions and it has graduated more than 22,000 students, who have gone on to successful careers locally, regionally and internationally in all professional fields of endeavor. The University also is a major contributor to the public and private sectors and to the national economy.

The University of Guyana offers certificate, diploma, associate degree, undergraduate degree, graduate (post-graduate) degree, and professional degree programs. These programmes are delivered through the following eight organisational units: seven Faculties and one School, each of which is headed by a Dean: Agriculture and Forestry; Earth and Environmental Studies; Education and Humanities; Health Sciences, with a School of Medicine; Natural Sciences; Social Sciences; and Engineering and Technology. The newest unit, the School of Entrepreneurship and Business Innovation (SEBI), was established in June 2017. The 2016-2017 academic year also witnessed the launch of Turkeyen and Tain Talks as a bi-monthly series to facilitate conversations with the community on important national and international

subjects, establishment of the Undergraduate Research Programmes and the hosting of successful inaugural student research conferences at Turkeyen and Tain, and founding of the The University of Guyana Press, as part of efforts to boost research and scholarship.

LEADERSHIP PROFILE

The University is governed by a Council, the policy making body, which currently is chaired by a Chancellor supported by a Pro-Chancellor. Both positions are non-executive positions. The current Chancellor is Professor E. Nigel Harris, MD, former Vice-Chancellor of The University of the West Indies. The administrative and academic head of the University is the Vice-Chancellor and Principal, who is also an ex officio member of the Council. The current—and Tenth-Vice-Chancellor and Principal is Professor Ivelaw Lloyd Griffith, appointed in June 2016. The Council has two statutory committee; the Finance and General Purposes Committee, and the Appointments Committee. The other major organ of governance is the Academic Board, which is supported by two statutory entities, the Academic Policy and Planning Committee, and the Board for Graduate Studies. The Academic Board is presided over by the Vice-Chancellor and Principal. The Vice-Chancellor is aided by an executive team that includes three Deputy Vice-Chancellors, a Registrar, a Bursar, and a Personnel Officer.

In August 2016 the Finance and General Purposes Committee (F&GPC), the second highest policy making body after the Council, approved a proposal by Vice-Chancellor Griffith to comprehensively restructure the university's leadership. The reorganisation plan aims to create greater levels of efficiency and effectiveness and set the stage for innovation in academic and non-academic areas. The changes, which became effective on October 1, 2016, entail having Dr Michael Scott, until recently Dean of the Faculty of Social Sciences, become Deputy Vice-Chancellor (DVC) of Academic Engagement. In addition to the Faculties within his portfolio, Dr Scott has oversight over

several new units. Two of them—a Centre for Excellence in Teaching and Learning and a School of Graduate Studies and Research—are being developed. The third unit is the Office of Undergraduate Research, which is headed by mathematician Dr Troy Thomas. The reorganisation also established the position of University Legal Counsel.

The former DVC of Academics, Dr Barbara Revnolds, became DVC for Planning and International Engagement, a new entity intended to streamline the university's planning and quality assurance operations and its international relationships, in an effort to create and strengthen resource. research, and other relationships with other universities and with international organisations. Professor Paloma Mohamed, a former Director for the Centre for Communication Studies and a former Dean of the Faculty of Social Sciences, assumed the newly created position of DVC of Philanthropy, Alumni and Civic Engagement (PACE), which has the mandate to enhance UG's fundraising, rebranding, alumni relationships, and public interchange, all of which are crucial to the University's renaissance. The Vice-Chancellor's executive capability has been strengthened with the establishment of an Office of Strategic Initiatives in the Vice-Chancellery, headed by Dr Fitzgerald Yaw, to undertake institutional strengthening, project management, and allied services. The Vice-Chancellor's Cabinet, which constitutes his executive team, comprises the DVCs, Registrar, Bursar, Personnel Officer, Director of the Berbice Campus, the Director of the Office of Strategic Initiatives, and the Chief of Staff, When appointed the University Legal Counsel will become part of the Cabinet.

On assuming the Vice-Chancellorship, Professor Griffith launched Project Renaissance, which aims to rebuild UG's educational and economic enterprise and enable it to become a consequential national and international educational stakeholder. The Project has four main pillars, called Imperatives. The first is Capital Investment, which involves human capital, physical capital, and brand capital.

The second—Academic Enhancement—entails improving instructional credentials, curricula and andragogy, and introducing new educational programmes and research to address national and regional business, civic, and overall development needs. The Economic Viability Imperative is the third pillar. It requires fortifying the major existing revenue streams—government subventions and tuition fees—but also expanding the revenue base, through alumni and corporate giving, grants, and merchandising. The fourth Imperative, Alumni and Civic Engagement, encompasses reaching out to graduates within and outside Guyana, celebrating their accomplishments, and inviting them to aid the continued pursuit of the university's laudable mission and goals.

CONVOCATION INNOVATIONS

For the first time in the history of the university, the certificates, diplomas and degrees were awarded at two ceremonies in 2017. The ceremony for the Faculties of Agriculture and Forestry, Earth and Environmental Sciences, Natural Sciences, and Technology, was held at the National Cultural Center (NCC) at 10:00 h, while the ceremony for the Faculties of Education and Humanities, Health Sciences, and Social Sciences was at the Sophia Exhibition Centre, at 16:30 h.

Additionally, unlike previous years, all students graduating with diplomas wore academic robes, along with those graduating with Bachelors and Masters degrees. Another new feature at last year's Convocations was use of ceremonial gonfalons, which are banners, often shield-shaped, that hang from crosspieces on top of poles. These banners are usually carried at the head of the Convocation procession and identify the different Faculties within the university from which students are graduating.

In 2018, three ceremonies will be held at the National Cultural Center. The first ceremony will be held at 9:00 h, and will feature the Faculties of Agriculture and Forestry, Earth and Environmental Sciences and Education and

Humanities, The second ceremony, for the Faculties of Engineering and Technology, Health Sciences and Natural Sciences, will be held at 13:00 h. While the largest of the three ceremonies will be held at 17:00 h for the Faculty of Social Sciences and the School of Entrepreneurship and Business Innovation.

And for the first time in 55 years, the institution will be awarding Honorary Doctorate Degrees. The recipients are Mr Edmond (Eddy) Grant for Excellence in Music and Civic Engagement; Mr Yesu Persaud for Iconic Leadership in Business and Banking; Mr Jairaj "Jay" Sobhraj for Excellence in Entrepreneurship and Philanthropy and Ms Laura George for Outstanding Community Development & Advocacy.

ABOUT Professor Eon Nigel Harris

Professor Eon Nigel Harris demitted office as Vice Chancellor of the University of the West Indies (UWI), a position he held from October 1, 2004 to April 30, 2015—on his retirement, he was named Vice-Chancellor Emeritus. Prior to joining the UWI, he was Dean and Senior Vice President for Academic Affairs at the Morehouse School of Medicine in Atlanta, Georgia from 1996 to 2004. He was previously a faculty member at the University of Louisville, in Kentucky (1987-1996) where he rose to the rank of Professor of Medicine and Chief of the Division of Rheumatology.

While he was Vice-Chancellor of UWI, he held many other leadership posts. He served as Chairman of the Caribbean Examination Council, (CXC) (2006-2014). He was elected Chairman of the Association of Commonwealth Universities for a 2 year term (2011-2013) after serving on the administrative board and executive committee for 4 years (this is a Consortium of 530 universities in the

Commonwealth). He is a current member of the

Administrative Board of the International Association of Universities (IAU), a consortium of more than 600 universities. He has served as President of the Association of Caribbean Universities and Research Institutes (UNICA) from 2012 to 2015. While Dean at the Morehouse School of Medicine, Professor Harris had a number of leadership roles including executive membership on the Committee of Deans of Association of American Medical Colleges(AAMC)

He is internationally known for his work as a Rheumatologist. With Doctors Aziz Gharavi and Graham Hughes in London, he helped to define a disorder which they called the Antiphospholipid Syndrome and devised a diagnostic test (the anticardiolipin test) for it. For this work he shared with Dr Graham Hughes, Dr Aziz Gharavi and others, the Ciba-Geigy Prize awarded by the International League Against Rheumatism (ILAR) in 1990. He has published over 150 papers, editorials, reviews and chapters on this subject and these have been cited in several thousand publications.

In 1987, he launched the Anti-phospholipid Standardisation Laboratory which led to worldwide efforts to standardise the anti-cardiolipin test and he developed standards for the test that are often referred to as the "Harris Standards". For his contributions to the field of Rheumatology, he was made a Master of the American College of Rheumatology in October 2014. While Vice-Chancellor of the University of the West Indies, he has focused on programmes that will enhance contributions of UWI to Caribbean Governments: strengthen services of the University to its stakeholders; broaden funding; and enhance alumni relations and marketing. A particular area of interest has been re-structuring the UWI presence in the 12 Caribbean countries that contribute to UWI but have no campuses (he referred to them as the "UWI-12"). This led to the creation of a fourth UWI campus, designated the

countries. During his tenure the Regional University's enrolment grew from about 24,000 to in excess of 47,000 students, the facilities in the 4 campuses expanded by more than 500,000 sq. ft. and two new countries – Bermuda and the Turks and Caicos - joined the UWI consortium.

He has received many honours and awards, including the Centennial Award for contributions to Medicine from the National Medical Association of America (USA) in 1995; The Howard University Distinguished Alumni Award for medical research and education (2009); the Martin Luther King International Award received in Washington DC in 2010 and the Caribbean Health Research Council Award (2011) for contributions to medical research. The country of his birth, Guyana, awarded him the Cacique Crown of Honour in 2011. In 2013, he received the Order of Merit Jose Joaquin Gomez award from the University of Cartagena (Colombia) and in September 2013, an honorary Doctor of Law Degree from the University of St Andrews (Scotland) on the occasion of its 600th anniversary. The 11th Congressional District of the USA declared February 11, 2015, the "Eon Nigel Harris Day" in recognition of his contributions to Medical Research.

Professor Harris graduated with a B.S. degree in chemistry-magna cum laude, high honours in chemistry, Phi Beta Kappa from Howard University (1968) and proceeded on a fellowship to Yale University, where he received a Master of Philosophy degree in Biochemistry (1973). He earned his medical degree (with alpha omega alpha honours) from the University of Pennsylvania (1977). He then returned to the Caribbean where he completed his residency in internal medicine at the University of the West Indies at Mona and was awarded the post-graduate degree, Doctor of Medicine (DM) in 1981. On completion of his DM degree, he went to the Hammersmith Hospital in London where he did a fellowship in Rheumatology (1983-85) and then served as Deputy Director of the Lupus Research Laboratory in the Rayne Institute at St. Thomas' Hospital, London, England

(it was in London that Professor Harris did critical work with Drs Graham Hughes and Aziz Gharavi to define the Antiphospholipid Syndrome)

He is married to Dr C. Yvette Williams-Harris, a general internist and they have three children and five grandchildren.

He was the Special Assistant to three Presidents of Guyana (2010-2017) and held the Chairmanship of several State and autonomous Boards including the National Agriculture Research and Extension Institute, the Guyana Geology and Mines Commission, and the National Protected Areas Trust. He was CEO of the Guyana Telephone & Telegraph Company (2005 – 2010), Executive Director of Conservation International Guyana (2001 – 2005), Chairman of the Guyana Elections Commission (2000 – 2001), Director General of the Guyana National Service (1981-1990), and Chief of Staff of the Guyana Defence Force (1990–2000).

He is an alumnus of Queen's College, the University of Guyana (Public Administration), the School of Earth and Environmental Sciences of the University of Greenwich (MSc & Protected Areas Management), the British Army Staff College, and the Royal College of Defence Studies (post graduate in International Affairs & Strategic Studies). He is a Fellow of the UK Chartered Management Institute

(FCMI) and a Fellow of the Royal Geographical Society (FRGS).

He is the recipient of Guyana's highest military award - the Military Service Star (MSS) and national and military awards from Brazil, Venezuela, Suriname, Cuba, France, and is an Officer of the Order of the Golden Ark of the Netherlands (for work in global conservation).

He is a published author on a wide range of topics for local, regional and peer-reviewed international publications. Since 2007 he has been a Member of the Regional Eminent Persons Selection Panel for the AN Sabga Caribbean Awards for Excellence. He is a Trustee of the Moray House Trust, Patron of the Guyana Heritage Society, the local representative of the UK Scientific Exploration Society, a Member of the Global Military Advisory Council on Climate Change, an Honorary Elder (since 1969) of the Wai Wai community in the upper Essequibo, the Chancellor's Representative on the Council of the University of Guyana (since 2016), and was unanimously elected by the University Council on March 8, 2018 as the Pro Chancellor for a period of three years.

He is married to Carolyn (1971) and they have one son, daughter in law and three grandchildren.

He is also a Member of the Board of the Institute of Private Enterprise Development (IPED), and Chairman of the Kidney Foundation of Guyana.

ABOUT Professor Ivelaw Lloyd Griffith

Professor Ivelaw Lloyd Griffith was appointed the Tenth Principal and Vice-Chancellor of The University of Guyana in June 2016, having served earlier as Executive-in-Residence at The University at Albany, State University of New York, and the Ninth President of Fort Valley State University in Georgia, where he led the right-sizing of the educational and economic enterprise, focusing on growing enrolment, enhancing the academic profile, controlling spending, launching Honours and Undergraduate Research programs, and initiating a feasibility study to establish a School of Entrepreneurship and Business Innovation.

A tenured professor of political science, he served from 2007 to 2013 as provost and senior vice-president at York College in New York where notable achievements included growing the full-time faculty by 30 percent, re-organising Academic Affairs into Schools of Business and Information Systems, Arts & Sciences, and Health Sciences and Professional Programmes, and enhancing research and scholarship by creating the Provost Lectures, the Distinguished Scholars Lectures, and the Undergraduate Research Programme. He also established Discovery to

celebrate and incentivise faculty excellence in research and service. Earlier, he had been provost at Radford University in Virginia, budget dean of the College of Arts and Sciences at Florida International University (FIU), and dean of The Honours College at FIU, all while holding his professorship.

A University of Guyana alumnus, he was the first person to graduate with distinction in political science. He also holds a Master of Arts from Long Island University, New York, and both a Master of Philosophy and a PhD. in Political Science from The City University of New York Graduate School. As well, he graduated from the Harvard Graduate School of Education's programme in educational leadership and the Millennium Leadership Institute of the American Association of State Colleges and Universities. An expert on Caribbean and hemispheric security, drugs and crime, he originated the concept of Geonarcotics in the early 1990s as a way to study the complex relationship involving drugs, geography, power and politics, outlining it first in Canada's leading international affairs scholarly magazine: "From Cold War Geopolitics to Post-Cold War Geonarcotics." International Journal Vol. 49 (Winter) 1993-94, 1-36.

Recipient of the 2017 Cacique Crown of Honour for exemplary international scholarship and transformational higher education leadership on the occasion of the 51st Anniversary of the Independence of Guyana and the 2015 William J. Perry Award for Excellence in Security and Défense Education named in honour of former United States Defence Secretary Dr William J. Perry. Professor Griffith has published seven books, including Strategy and Security in the Caribbean (1991), the highly acclaimed Drugs and Security in the Caribbean (1997), the research for which was funded by the MacArthur Foundation in the United States, The Political Economy of Drugs in the Caribbean (2000), and Caribbean Security in the Age of Terror (2004). Most recently, he wrote The United States and the Caribbean 30 years after the Grenada Invasion: Dynamics of Geopolitics and Geonarcotics for the Dr. William J. Perry Centre of the United States National

Defence University.

His more than 50 academic and policy articles have appeared in numerous prestigious publications, including Security and Defence Studies Review (US), Social and Economic Studies (Caribbean), Low Intensity Conflict and Law Enforcement (US), Naval War College Review (US), Third World Quarterly (UK), Journal of Money Laundering Control (UK), Caribbean Quarterly (Caribbean), Caribbean Studies (Caribbean), Journal of Commonwealth and Comparative Politics (UK), University of Miami Law Review (US), Caribbean Perspectives (Caribbean), Dickinson Journal of International Law (US). Caribbean Affairs (Caribbean), Conflict Quarterly (Canada), Mershon International Studies Review (US), UN Institute for Disarmament Research Newsletter (UN), The Round Table (UK), Latin American Research Review (US), International Journal (Canada), Journal of the Association of Caribbean Commissioners of Police (Caribbean), INTERSEC: Journal of International Security (UK). Summit of the Americas Bulletin (US), Joint Force Quarterly (US), CARICOM Perspective (Caribbean), and New West Indian Guide (Holland). His work also has appeared in several encyclopaedia, including The Encyclopaedia of Drugs, Alcohol, and Addictive Behaviour and Defence and Security: A Compendium of National Armed Forces and Security Policies.

Professor Griffith has been a consultant to the Commonwealth Secretariat, USAID, Canada's Ministry of Foreign Affairs and International Trade, and several agencies in the United States and the Caribbean, and he has testified before the U.S. Congress on Caribbean security issues. A past president of the Caribbean Studies Association, he has been a visiting scholar at the

Dr. William J. Perry Centre for Hemispheric Defence Studies in Washington, DC., the Royal Military College of Canada, and the George Marshall European Centre for Security Studies in Germany. He also has served on the editorial board of Security and Defence Studies Review and other journals.

In 2012-2013 he was among the Group of Experts commissioned by the Secretary General of the Organization of American States to review hemispheric drug policies and practices and offer anti-drug scenarios through 2025, and in 2016 he was invited to deliver the Spring 2016 Global Studies Lecture at Wenzhou-Kean University in China.

As well, Professor Griffith has been quoted in numerous media, including The New York Times, Time, Ft. Lauderdale Sun Sentinel, New York Carib News, Barbados Nation, Tages-Anzeiger (Switzerland), Washington Post, Associated Press, US News and World Report, Miami Herald, San Antonio Express News, Stabroek News and Kaieteur News (Guyana), Trinidad Express, Christian Science Monitor, Dallas Morning News, New Jersey Star Ledger, Los Angeles Times, New Jersey Courier, BBC World Service, and Gleaner (Jamaica). A Rotarian, he also has served on the Vestry of St. George's Episcopal Church in New York, where he headed the Ambassador Programme and Education Committee. He currently attends St. George's Cathedral. Once a trustee of the Jamaica Centre for Arts & Learning in New York, he also led the academic component of Guyana's Golden Jubilee independence celebrations, which held symposia in Georgetown and New York. He and his wife of three decades, Francille, a registered nurse, have two adult children and one grandchild.

On assuming the Vice-Chancellorship, Professor Griffith launched Project Renaissance, which aims to rebuild UG's educational and economic enterprise and enable it to become a consequential national and international educational stakeholder. The Project has four main pillars, called Imperatives. The first is Capital Investment, which involves human capital, physical capital, and brand capital. instructional credentials, curricula and pedagogy, and introducing new educational programs and research to address national and regional business, civic, and overall development needs. The Economic Viability Imperative is the third pillar. The Renaissance efforts have begun to bear notable fruit. These include construction of a Student Social Complex; improvement of physical facilities and of WiFi access at Turkeyen, Tain, Dennis Irvine Hall and elsewhere; publication of Renaissance as a regular electronic newsletter to showcase the work of students, staff, and alumni: hosting of the First Educational Resource Ambassadors conference and establishment of the Vice Chancellor's Fund for Strategic Initiatives; the launching of a new UG website; the cultivation of beneficial relationships with business, government, and diplomatic stakeholders; the début of the Etiquette Training Program for Student Leaders; and promotion of the Arts, including the appointment of music icon Keith Waithe as the first Distinguished Visiting Artistin-Residence since the 1980s, when literary luminary Martin Carter last held the position on a permanent basis.

Also noteworthy have been the reorganisation of the university's senior leadership with the creation of Deputy Vice Chancelleries for (1) Academic Engagement, (2) Planning and International Engagement, and (3) Philanthropy, Alumni and Civic Engagement, and an Office of Strategic Initiatives; creation of Turkeyen and Tain Talks as a bi-monthly series to facilitate conversations with the community on important national and international subjects; establishment of the Undergraduate Research Programme and the hosting of the successful inaugural

student research conferences at Turkeyen and Tain; the commissioning of a feasibility study which led to the creation of the School of Entrepreneurship and Business Innovation (SEBI); the hosting of the country's first Diaspora Engagement Conference; and establishment of the University of Guyana Press, as part of efforts to boost research and scholarship.



ABOUT Professor David Phoenix

Professor David Andrew Phoenix, OBE, DL, DUniv, FAcSS, DSc is the Vice-Chancellor of London South Bank University, he sits on a number of national bodies overseeing UK higher education such as Universities UK, National Centre for Universities and Business as well as MillionPlus. He is also a member of the Minister for Universities and Science Brexit advisory forum. He was elected to Fellowship of the Royal College of Physicians (Edinburgh) for his contribution to medical research and education and recognised as an Academician by the Academy of Social Sciences for his work in areas linked to educational policy. In 2015 the Prime Minister appointed him as a trustee of the Science Museum Group.

With over 250 publications, Professor Phoenix is a Fellow of the Royal Society of Chemistry, The Society of Biology, The Institute of Mathematics and Its Applications and the Royal Society of Medicine. Through these latter bodies he has engaged in a range of discussions regarding the skills agenda, especially related to employer requirements. In 2010 he was made an Officer of the Most Excellent Order of the British Empire for services to Science and Higher

Education and appointed as a Deputy Lieutenant of Greater London in 2015.

He has worked extensively overseas developing and leading on an overseas campus in Cyprus and a research institute in China. He was awarded an individual Excellence award by China's Vice Premier in 2014 and was given the Friendship award (China) in 2016 by the Premier for his outstanding contribution to the country's economic and social development.

ABOUT Mr Ednond Grant

Mr Edmond (Eddy) Grant stands among an elite group of artists as one who has not just merely moved successfully across the musical spectrum, but has actually been at the forefront of genres and even created one of his own. From pop star to reggae radical, musical entrepreneur to the inventor of ringbang, the artist has cut a swath through the world of music and made it his own.

Born in Plaisance, Guyana, on March 5, 1948, the young Edmond Grant grew up on the sound of his homeland, tan singing, and an Indo-Caribbean vocal style whose roots lay in South Asia and are the backbone of modern chutney. Then in 1960, the Grant family emigrated to England, taking up residence in the working-class Stoke Newington area of London. The young teen's musical horizons swiftly expanded, embracing the R&B, blues, and rock that percolated across his new island home.

In 1965, Grant formed his first band, the Equals, and long before the days of 2-Tone, the group was unique in being the first of Britain's multi-racial bands to receive any recognition. The West Indian contingent comprised Jamaican-born singer Lincoln Gordon, with his twin brother Dervand Grant both on guitar, while the rhythm section of bassist Patrick Lloyd and drummer John Hall were native-born white Englishmen. Like most of the teenaged bands roaming the capital at the time, the Equals cut their teeth on the club and pub circuit and finally inked a label deal with President Records in early 1967. Their debut single, "I Won't Be There," didn't crack the charts but did receive major radio support. This, alongside an expanding fan base wowed by their live shows, pushed their first album, Unequaled Equals, into the U.K. Top Ten.

At the request of his label, Grant had also been working with the Pyramids, the British group who had backed Prince Buster on his recent U.K. tour. Besides composing songs for the band (and one for Buster himself, the rude classic "Rough Rider"), Grant also produced several tracks, including the band's debut single and sole hit, "Train to Rainbow City." In 1968, the Equals scored their own hit with "I Get So Excited," the group's debut into the Top 50. Although their follow-up album, Equals Explosion, proved less successful than its predecessor, as did the next single, the quintet's career was indeed about to explode. "Hold Me Closer" may have disappointed in the U.K., where it stalled at a lowly number 50, but in Germany, the single was flipped over and "Baby Come Back" released as the A-side. It swiftly soared to the top of the German charts, a feat repeated across Europe.

Later that spring, a reissued British single finally received its just due and reached number one. Even the U.S. took notice, sending the single into the lower reaches of the Top 40. Sadly, this turned out to be a flash in the pan. The Equals' follow-up single, "Laurel and Hardy" died at number 35; its successor did even worse, while their new album, Sensational Equals, didn't even make the charts. New hope arrived when "Viva Bobby Joe" shot into the Top Ten in the summer of 1969, but its follow-up, "Rub a Dub," just scraped into the Top 35. Understandable, considering the Equals' roller coaster of ups and downs, Grant now turned his

attention elsewhere.

In 1970, he started up his own specialty record label, Torpedo, concentrating on British reggae artists. He also utilised the label as a home for a brief solo career under the alias Little Grant, releasing the single "Let's Do It Together." But the artist had not given up on the Equals yet, and good thing too. Later that year, their new 45, "Black Skinned Blue Eved Boys," slammed the group back into the Top Ten. And then, the unimaginable happened. On New Year's day in 1971, Grant, all of 23 years old, suffered a heart attack and a collapsed lung. If lifestyle played a part, it wasn't because he drank, took drugs, smoked, or ate meat; it was due to Grant's only vice - a hectic schedule. He guit the group at this point and the Equals soldiered on into the shadows without him. He sold Torpedo as well and with the proceeds opened up his own recording studio, The Coach House, in 1972.

Mr Grant continued to produce other artists and release their records through his newly launched Ice label, but his own musical talents were seemingly left behind. It wasn't until 1977 when Grant finally released a record of his own, the Message Man album. It was three years in the making and a stunning about-face from his previous pop persona, even if "Black Skinned Blue Eyed Boys" had suggested a change was imminent. Tracks like "Cockney Black." "Race Hate," and "Curfew" were politicised dark masterpieces laced with aggression and anger. But the album also included some lighter moments, including "Hello Africa," which featured a sound that the media hadn't even invented a word for yet. Grant dubbed it "kaisoul," an amalgamation of kaiso (the traditional word for calvpso) and soul. Caribbean legend Lord Shorty, the acknowledged inventor of this new crossover hybrid, labeled it solka. Neither term stuck, however, once the Trinidad and Tobago press came up with their own label: soca. But regardless of what it was called, the style was just one of many hybrids that Grant was entertaining. Message Man may have proved a commercial failure, but that didn't dim the artist's vision for one second.

Two more years passed while Grant wrestled with its followup in the studio, composing, producing, and performing virtually the entire album himself. The end result was 1979's Walking on Sunshine, one of the greatest albums of the decade. While the B-side featured a clutch of seminal musical hybrids, the centerpiece of the album's A-side was "Living on the Frontline," a dancefloor classic that blended tough lyrics with an electronic sheen, a sense of optimism, and a funk-fired sound. Released as a single, the song roared up the British chart, while becoming a cult hit in U.K. clubs. Inexplicably, the album itself did not chart at all, nor did its follow-up, 1980's Love in Exile. However, in the next year, Grant finally cracked the market wide open with Can't Get Enough, which finally breached the Top 40. His singles' success had continued uninterrupted across "Do You Feel My Love," "Can't Get Enough of You," and "I Love You, Yes I Love You." A phenomenal live album, Live at Notting Hill, was recorded in August 1981 during London's Notting Hill Carnival. The following year's Killer on the Rampage slew its way into both the British and American charts, where it landed at number ten. The album spun off "I Don't Wanna Dance," which topped the chart in the U.K., while the exhilarating "Electric Avenue," from his next album, Going for Broke, landed at number two on both sides of the Atlantic.

Nothing else would equal these dizzying heights. Three more singles followed by the end of 1984, but none managed to break into the Top 40. In the U.S., only one, "Romancing the Stone," actually made the chart, charming its way into a respectable berth just outside the Top 25. That was his final showing in the U.S. On both sides of the Atlantic, 1987's Born Tuff and the following year's File Under Rock were passed over by the record-buying public. However, the British gave the artist one last Top Ten hit in 1988 with "Gimme Hope Jo'anna," a highlight of his 1990 Barefoot Soldier album. Unfortunately, its 1992 follow-up, Painting of the Soul, went the way of its last few predecessors. By then, the artist had long ago left the U.K.,

having emigrated to Barbados a decade earlier. Even as his own career had taken off back in England, Grant was spending much of his time mentoring a new generation of soca talent. He opened a new studio, Blue Wave, and lavished most of his attention on it, which explains the gap in his output between 1984 and 1987. By the time "Jo'anna" had fallen off the chart, Grant was well on the way to creating his own mini-empire.

Besides giving new stars-to-be a helping hand, Grant also moved into music publishing, specialising in calvpso's legends. Over the years, Ice has thrilled the world by making the back catalog of multitudes of stars available: Lord Kitchener, Roaring Lion, and Mighty Sparrow, to name a few. And almost uniquely among Caribbean artists, Grant has maintained control over his own music, and Ice, of course, has kept it available. Across Grant's solo career, the artist has continued to experiment with different styles in ever-changing combinations. Pop, funk, new wave, reggae, Caribbean, African, and even country have all been melded into his sound. 1992's Painting of the Soul was heavy with island influences, while the next year's Soca Baptism is a collection of covers, from hits to obscurities, all dosed with a modern sound. By this time, Grant was hard at work in the evolution of yet another hybrid style: ringbang. Many of the genre's elements are easily found in the artist's earlier recordings, from African rhythms to military tattoos, alongside soca itself and dancehall rhythms, many of the latter influenced by Grant's own previous work. The new style debuted in 1994 at the Barbados Crop Over festival. Since then, the style has continued to intrigue, but has vet to create the international success that it's always threatened. Much of this can be laid at Grant's own door, through a simmering dispute with other artists and the legal ramifications of the genre's trademark.

A passionate supporter of artists' rights, Grant first ran into trouble in 1996 when he demanded his label's artists receive adequate copyright fees from Trinidad and Tobago's Carnival. A heroic stance that infuriated the festival's

organisers, this was quickly overshadowed by the public outcry over soca itself. As far as T&T was concerned, the inventor of soca was island native Lord Shorty, who announced its birth in 1978 with the Soca Explosion album. However, Grant insists otherwise, crediting his own "Black Skinned Blue Eyed Boys" as the first-ever soca record. Needless to say, his public proclamations of this fact continue to infuriate T&T and other Shorty supporters. But politics aside, the greater factor may be in ringbang's trademark. Once Grant filed it, the word could no longer be used by other artists without express permission.

A perusal of any soca, calvpso, or chutney hits collection shows the importance of the use of the genre term to the actual song, and just how many titles feature the term. By preventing artists from using the word ringbang, few outside the Ice stable were willing to explore the genre. Even so, Grant managed to organise the Ringbang Celebration 2000 as part of T&T's millennium festivities. In the new year, he recorded a new version of one of them, "East Dry River," while in Jamaica, appropriately enough in a ska style. The previous year, the artist released the Hearts & Diamonds album, with Reparation following in 2006. Grant continues to make an impact on both sides of the studio, with his music always an intriguing concoction of sound and his studio work equally innovative. Ice itself is equally instrumental in the music world, both in its preservation of past legacies and its attention to new artists.

Mr Yesu Persaud

ABOUT Mr Yesu Persaud

Mr Yesu Persaud was born on October 18, 1928 at Diamond Sugar Plantation where his grandfathers had arrived from Uttar Pradesh, India as an indentured sugar worker in 1863/4. His father and mother were also born at Diamond Estate and worked in the Sugar Industry. Yesu had a full primary education, went to High School but could not go very far there since he had to start working at age 17 as his parents could not afford his further schooling. For a few years he worked at the US airbase at Atkinson field and in the capital, Georgetown, as a Customs Clerk. He, however discovered that he could not make much further progress in white-collar employment in the capital since the Insurance companies and the expatriate industrial and commercial companies including the Banks, did not employ Indians. He then returned to Diamond Plantation and joined the workforce, becoming in four years a Supervisor, the highest position a local could achieve.

In London, Yesu was employed in the usual semi-skilled jobs foreign immigrants usually take up. His sights were however always focused on doing the ACCA and becoming a top accountant. He studied very hard, and despite the distraction of having to work and study, he was able to complete his ACCA in good time. He was shortly after accepted as an Associate Member of the ACCA. He continued to work with a large professional accounting firm and was appointed Senior Auditor responsible for a number of clients in London and the home counties. His income level had grown and he made a number of wise and profitable investments. He was now ready to return home as a qualified accountant with fairly reasonable financial means.

In 1966, he returned and joined the Public Service as an Inspector of Taxes. After a few months, he ventured into private industry. He joined Sandbach Parker & Company, the oldest British company in Guyana which had been operating here from the 18th Century. In record time, he rose to be the Group Finance Director, a position which so far had only been open to qualified expatriates. In 1975 the Government of Guyana decided to nationalise the Demerara Sandbach Group and Yesu was one of the three negotiators on the Sandbach side. Yesu was offered the tempting offer in the UK if he were to leave the nationalised company. He, however decided to stay in Guyana and serve.

The Government offered him the Executive Chairmanship of Diamond Liquors Limited and the Managing Directorship of Demerara Sugar Company together with other responsibilities to integrate a private conglomerate into a state-owned company. He took on this enormous challenge and in a short number of years was able to achieve a business miracle with regards to Demerara Distillers Limited, which stands out in the economic history of Guyana in creating one of the most modern Spirits distilleries in the World, with the award-winning El Dorado.

Demerara Distillers Limited has diversified into many profitable fields including the production and distribution of some of the world's choicest soft drinks such as Pepsi, 7UP, Mountain Dew, the Gatorade and Tropicana range, DDL Topco Fruit Juices produced in the most modern Tetra Pak in the Caribbean, DDL Diamond Mineral water range of

products. It has other subsidiary or associated companies such as Demerara Shipping, Demerara Bank Ltd. CO2 Gas Company, Diamond Fire and General Insurance Inc. Trust Company (Guyana) Ltd., and the distribution company representing many of the World's major brands. The company now has subsidiaries in Holland, USA, St. Kitts, Trinidad and Tobago and distribution arrangements in Asia, including a small Joint Venture in Andra Pradesh, India.

Yesu Persaud's achievements in business and in the field of wealth creation are legendary but equally so are his achievements in other fields. He is a great believer in the virtues and effectiveness of Private Enterprise and the Free Market in human development. He has accordingly been associated with, or founded institutions which promote private enterprise and help others to participate in it. H conceived the idea of a private sector bank in the late sixties. Held in abeyance but reactivated in 1991. Demerara Bank was incorporated on January 20, 1992 and on November 12, 1994 was declared open by His Excellency the Late President, Dr. Cheddi B. Jagan.

The Institute of Private Enterprise Development (IPED) was founded by Yesu Persaud's in 1985. IPED provided an opening for those who were excluded from state-run entities or who desired to do their own businesses. With the assistance of the Pan American Development Fund and CIDA and generous local contributions, IPED was able to provide loans and training to entrepreneurs. IPED over the last 19 years has financed over 40,000 entrepreneurs and has net assets of G\$1.1 Billion. IPED's achievements have attracted much international interest.

Mr Persaud conceived the Private Sector Commission (PSC) and founded it in 1991 at a time when the private business community had been almost destroyed. The PSC united the Private Sector, revitalised it institutionally and gave it an important voice at a very critical time. The PSC has been advocating ongoing reforms to the business environment, has been involved in various high-grade

governmental committees, has helped in social stabilisation and has always given assistance in achieving free, fair and peaceful national elections.

One of his memorable achievements, an event which holds a place of importance in the socio-cultural history of Guyana, is the 150th Anniversary Celebration of the Arrival of Indians in Guyana. He conceived the celebrations and was appointed Chairman of the 150th Anniversary Committee. At that time, the Indians were fragmented; four Muslim organisations and eight Hindu organisations. The Committee was very successful in bringing all of them together for the celebrations.

Though his international involvement in the field of business has been very wide, Mr. Persaud's involvement in the socio-cultural arena is equally important. For example, he has served for many years as the Honorary Consul of Chile, on the Caribbean Council of Europe, as a Trustee of Caribbean Latin American Action, as President of the Caribbean Association of Industry and Commerce, Chairman of the West Indies Spirits Producers Association, and as a founder-member of Global Organization of People of Indian Origin (GOPIO).

Mr Persaud is the recipient of many national and international awards and honors, including the Cacique Crown of Honour, the Golden Arrow of Achievement, the Ghandi Organisation Plaque, Lifetime Awards from the Guyana Manufacturers' Association and Georgetown Chamber of Commerce & Industry, the Honorary Doctorates from Warwick University and the University of the West Indies, St. Augustine Campus. As well, Warwick University renamed its Centre for Caribbean Studies as The Yesu Persaud Centre For Caribbean Studies.

Professor Norman Munroe

ABOUT Professor Norman Munroe

Dr Munroe is a full Professor in the Mechanical and Materials Engineering department, College of Engineering & Computing (CEC) at Florida International University. He received his BS in Chemistry & Physics from Dar-es-Salaam University; M.Phil. in Mineral Engineering, Leeds University, UK; MS in Metallurgical Engineering from the University of British Columbia, Canada; and Eng.Sc.D. in Chemical Metallurgy from Columbia University, New York.

Dr Munroe's research focuses on the design and deployment of renewable energy systems, extractive metallurgical systems and biomedical devices. As Principal Investigator of the Western Hemisphere Information Exchange program (WHIX-2008) at FIU-Applied Research Center (ARC), he developed a Mobil Medical Clinic powered by a hybrid wind/solar energy system for deployment to the Dominican Republic in partnership with the US Southern Command. He also managed the production of biodiesel and its usage in engines of land, sea and air vehicles at the Panama Institute of Technology in partnership with the US Military Group.

His work on the corrosion and biocompatibility of implant materials has led to 2 US patents on the mitigation of Thrombosis associated with cardiovascular devices. He has served as Chairman of the Mechanical Engineering Department, Associate Dean of Research and Graduate Affairs, Associate Director and Director of ARC, and Associate Dean, Undergraduate Studies and Academic Affairs, in the College of Engineering & Computing at FIU. He also served as the Director of the Office of Student Access and Success and Director of the Center for Diversity in Engineering and Computing. He has been the major Advisor of 26 doctoral and master's students and a member of 120 graduate dissertation committees.

Dr Munroe has published over two hundred (210) Journal articles/Proceedings/Presentations/Book Chapters. He is the recipient of several awards including the FIU Excellence in Teaching award, the Florida State Teaching Incentive Program award and the "Top Black Educator" 2016 award from Legacy Magazine. This year at the 20th Award Assembly of the International Association of Advanced Materials, Stockholm, Sweden, Dr Munroe received the IAAM Medal for notable and outstanding research in Advanced Materials Science & Technology.

ABOUT Mr Jairaj "Jay" Sobhraj

Mr Jairaj "Jay" Sobhraj is an international entrepreneur, philanthropist and founder of The Jay and Sylvia Foundation. A Man of Action, he was born in the Land of the Mighty Roraima, Guyana in 1948. He is the son of a rice farmer and one of 10 siblings hailing from the county of Berbice. From his humble beginnings in Guyana, Jay Sobhraj's personal discipline, dedication to hard work and focus on community has made him one of the most successful Guyanese in the Diaspora. Jay Sobhraj is the Senior Vice President of Zara Realty, leading operations and renovations across the company's 5,000 units of property in The United States of America.

His 70 years spans work and study in four continents: South America (Guyana), Europe (England), Asia (Abu Dhabi), and North America (USA). A qualified engineer by profession, Jay earned his degree at the Middlesex Polytechnic of Central London in the 1970's and became a Chartered Engineer and Member of the Institute of Mechanical Engineers (C. Eng. M.I. Mech. E.), United Kingdom in 1984. In Guyana, Mr. Sobhraj worked as a project engineer in the Guyana Bauxite Company Mines

Division, in the 1970's. He then spent 11 years in Abu Dhabi with the National Petroleum Construction Company, Abu Dhabi, U.A.E as plant superintendent on an oil production plant in the petrochemical industry in the Middle East. His expertise is focused upon heavy steel fabrication and installation of pipe work for oil and gas.

Enduring the difficult and dangerous professional terrain in the oil industry provided Jay and his wife Sylvia -a nurse by profession- a solid foundation upon which he could build his second phase of professional endeavor - entrepreneurial real estate. Upon leaving The United Arab Emirates, Jay co-founded Zara Realty, named after his daughter, with two of his nine brothers, Ken and George. Into this enterprise he poured his experience and expertise in engineering, field operations, and leadership and helped build a real estate empire starting in the New York area which now spans several American cities. His quietly jocular nature, his personal caring character and respect for others underlies a shrewd business mind - with a lot of heart.

Jay established the Jay and Sylvia Sobhraj Foundation (JSS) 11 years ago, in 2007, after years of informally giving to various causes in Guyana and the USA. He and his wife, along with a few good Guyanese compatriots, unofficially formed The Jay and Sylvia Sobhraj Foundation which was later legally registered. Since then, the Jay and Sylvia Sobhraj Foundation has gifted over G\$400 million, roughly US\$2 million to a myriad of Guyanese causes in their native country and in their adopted home, the United States of America. The Foundation's work focuses on technology, education, mental health and development of children and young people.

Some of the major projects of the Jay and Sylvia Foundation include US\$ 475,000 to University of Guyana to build a new building that will house mental health resources for community wellness. The donation will support the education of new professionals in the field of mental health to deliver improved education and care to the people of

Guyana. The foundation also provides five scholarships to students at University annually and has pledged another US\$ 200,000 for student related support in the next 10 years.

ABOUT Mr Kamal Ramkarran

Kamal Ramkarran is an Attorney-at-Law and a Partner at Cameron & Shepherd, Guyana's oldest law firm, which was established in 1901 and has continuously operated as a partnership since then.

Kamal was admitted to practice law in Guyana in October, 2002, having obtained a Legal Education Certificate from Hugh Wooding Law School in September, 2002 and a Bachelor of Laws degree with honours from the University of the West Indies in September, 2000.

In addition, Kamal is the holder of a Diploma in Public Management, awarded by the University of Guyana in 1997, a Master of Laws degree in Commercial and Corporate Law awarded by the University of London in 2006, a Postgraduate Certificate in Financial Services Law with Merit awarded by the University of London in 2015 and a Postgraduate Diploma in International Business Law with Merit awarded by the University of London in 2017. In October, 2018 he completed his final exams for a Master of Laws degree in Banking and Finance Law with the University of London.

During the sixteen years he has practiced law, Kamal has represented the State, public authorities, banks, companies and individuals in areas such as civil law, constitutional law, administrative law and criminal law in the Magistrates' Court, the High Court, the Court of Appeal and the Caribbean Court of Justice. He has also provided legal advice and opinions to a wide variety of companies and statutory bodies, both locally and from outside of Guyana.

A number of the judgments in cases in which he has appeared have been reported in the West Indian Law Reports and one has been reported in the Law Reports of the Commonwealth.

Between 2006 and 2016, Kamal was appointed by each Minister of Health (now Minister of Public Health) as a member of the Medical Council of Guyana every two years on the expiration of the life of each Council.

He is the President of the Bar Association of Guyana, having been elected to that position in May, 2017 and re-elected in May, 2018.

Kamal is married to Nafeeza and they have two cats, Sexy and Bobby.

Ms Laura George

ABOUT Ms Laura George

Ms Laura George is a proud Akawaio from Phillipi, Upper Mazaruni, Region 7. A product of the Campbellville Secondary School, the Government Technical Institute, and the Cyril Potter College of Education, she is a trained teacher and mother of three girls. She is a pioneer of the Amerindian People's Association (APA) who resigned from teaching to render service on a voluntary basis to the Indigenous Community. Ms George started working at the APA as a Programme Assistant eight years ago and currently is the organisation's Governance and Rights Coordinator.

Ms George has been a passionate advocate for indigenous rights and has worked with indigenous communities throughout Guyana on several issues, including land rights, mining, forestry, labor exploitation, and women's rights. She has worked to ensure that policies and legislation protect indigenous rights, especially where mining has impacted negatively on the social and physical environment of the communities and on their land rights generally. In the case of the forest sector, she also has sought to ensure that legislation protects indigenous rights at all levels. Moreover, she has worked with communities in seeking to impart

information on Guyana's FLEGT VPA (Forest Law Enforcement, Governance and Trade Voluntary Partnerships Agreement) and its implications for indigenous communities, and she has participated in discussions on the subject high levels in Guyana and in Europe.

Among her notable community engagement and advocacy, she served as a member of the Phillipai Village Council from 1996 to 1999, provided translation services for the Van Mendason et al vs Attorney General, Guyana (the first lawsuit of its kind in Guyana), provide translation services for indigenous leaders and elders at various forums and in legal support cases whenever available, and secured pro bono legal representation for various causes of several members of the indigenous community. Ms George also was a panelist as part of Guyana's Independence golden Jubilee's celebration, a member of the Steering Committee of the nation's Readiness PhaseForest Carbon Partnership Facility Programme, and an alternate representative for Indigenous Peoples on the Multi-Stakeholder Group of the Guyana EITI.

Her experience in working with indigenous organisations and participating at international conferences includes serving as a panelist on one thematic area at the Oslo Tropical Forest Forum 2018 opposite the Minister of State of Guyana, as a panelist at the Norwegian International Tropical Forest Conference 2016, and a delegate at the Indigenous Conference in Belize under the University of the West Indies Impact Justice Project, March 2016. As well, she delivered a presentation to the 14th Session on the United Nations Permanent Forum on the Rights of Indigenous Issues. Ms. George is a firm believer in the preservation and protection of indigenous people's culture, especially the preservation of their languages. Also notable is that she has been engaged in humanitarian work and was one of the APA's volunteers in seeking food and other supplies when several communities in Region 8 were flooded in 2016. She also does hospital visits when persons ----

from the interior need support and has advocated for prisoner support in cases of wrongful detention and imprisonment.

Among her current projects are: the Forest Carbon Partnership Facility, which focuses on creating a readiness mechanism for payments for carbon based services; EU Forest Law Enforcement Governance and Trade, which addresses developing a forest legality licensing system for timber and timber products; and Forest Land Allocation, which part of the ongoing work of the Guyana Forestry Commission and the APA where there is advocacy for challenges that existing and new Amerindian villages and communities face. She also has been involved in the Low Carbon Development Strategy and the current Green State Development Strategy, in being a strong advocate for representing indigenous people's views and perspectives. The Guyana Norway Agreement also is an area of engagement by her, as it pertains to addressing and updating on land rights, forest governance and natural resources issues that are associated with indigenous people's villages and communities.
